Incels

Elliot Rodger

- May 2014: killed 6, inured 14
- Canonised by incels: Saint Elliot (Witt, 2020)
- My Twisted World
 - 141 page memoir/ manifesto
 - Instrumentalisation: women = status
 - Shooting = Day of Retribution for rejection
- Also: Jake Davison (UK), Alek Minassian (Canada)

Involuntary celibates i.e., incels

- Subculture of the "manosphere"
- Socially inhibited young men (Bates, 2020)
- Beta male identity: social identity based around social/ biological inferiority
- Red pill: gynocentric, status quo empowers women to date above market value
- Black pill: recognising inceldom as permanent (Bratich & Banet-Weiser, 2019)

The present study

Research questions:

- 1. What draws young men to incel communities?
- 2. What does the incel social identity mean to them?
- 3. Why/how do former incels leave their communities?
- 4. Were their emotional needs met by incel communities?



Method

- Participants: 7 members of digital ex-incel support groups
- Interview based research about experiences in incel communities
- Asked about life before, what they got out of it, leaving and changes since
- Data presently being analysed via thematic analysis (Braun & Clarke, 2012)
 - Transcription, reading and familiarization, coding, searching for themes, reviewing themes, defining/naming themes, finalising analysis.


To our knowledge, among first studies to speak with former incels
