

- Judge Mackenzie Stuart 1973 1988
- Pioneer, and President; From Aberdeen Sheriff Court to the Kirchberg
- Judge David Edward 1989 2004
- Unique role: Court of First Instance (1989 1992), Advocate General, Court of Justice (1992 -2004); Junior to Mackenzie Stuart as Senior
- Judge lan Forrester 2015 2020
- Devilling for (future) Judge Edward: End of an era; tenure overshadowed by Brexit
  - "...sense of a legal and historical communion between the law of Scotland and other European systems of law"

- Judge Mackenzie Stuart Judge Rapporteur in case 8/74 Dassonville
- Defined meaning of Art 34 TFEU
- Most important EU judgment? Second most cited by EU judges
- AG J-P Warner: Introduces a common law inspired "reasonableness"
- Too broad a definition?
- Enduring legacy: Continues to shape the functioning of the internal market since 2020, 10 citations

- Judge David Edward: authoring an anthem for EU Citizenship?
- Case C-184/99 Grzelczyk
- "Union citizenship is destined to be the fundamental status of nationals of the Member States..."
- Rooted in prior caselaw: Konstantinidis, Bickel and Franz, Uecker, Martinez-Sala, Kaur
- Codified in EU Legislation (Dir 2004/38)
- 150 citations of the *Grzelczyk* "mantra", 2001 2023
- Enduring legacy: 16 citations in EU court since Brexit
- Four Grand Chamber judgments 2020 2023: A, BY, VMA and S

# "A Scot without Borders"

Case T-316/14 PKK v The Council





- Judge lan Forrester
- Shepherding the Scottish judicial voice in Luxembourg to a close
- Judge in the first instance General Court; implications, comparison with CJEU
- Brought significant competition law expertise to the role
- The PKK v Council saga; a drama in four acts
- T-316/14 (2018) Council act listing PKK as terrorist organisation, annulled
- C-46/19 P (2021) overturns 2018 judgment and refers case back to the GC
- T-316/14 RENV (2022) annulled the 2014 acts maintaining the listing of the PKK on the EU's terrorism sanctions list
- Enduring legacy: pending case C-44/23 P.....

Looking back: evidence of the extent to which Scottish judges have uniquely helped to shape the "new legal order"

Looking back: connections, collegiality, compassion and clarity all fed into the unique contribution of the three Scottish judges

Looking back: the supranational legal order would have remained abstract without cases like *Dassonville* and *Grzelczyk* providing the substance for supranationalism

Looking forward: their legacy lives on in Luxembourg
